THE CONCEPT - PAN

This proposal for post-pandemic, neo-ecstatic dance/performance/art uses psycho-physical trance aesthetics as a powerful, direct expression of the human psyche. The word panic originates from the Greek god, Pan – half human, half goat, who frolics in green pastures and forest but creates pan-ic when he is unsettled. Confusion, division and pan-ic were signs of the recent pan-demic. During such times, our participation in art can lead us to a re-ordering and rediscovery of our true nature. In his seminal essay "Theatre and the Plague", Antonin Artaud points out - "we do not die in our dreams...our will operates even in absurdity, even in the negation of possibility, even in the transmutation of the lies from which truth can be remade." (Artaud, The Theatre and Its Double.)



What are the most fundamental impulses where movements originate? In the empty space of a square a dancer is revealed through gravity, grace and restraint. While automatic psycho-physical pulses arise from inhabited areas of self, resisting them evokes new kind of drives. We are interested in those drives, which are atonal, unknown, unbridled, exposing blockages, fears and abjection. Appropriated in a situation of "nowhere to hide" by a touch of graceful compassion, they become lines of poetry addressed to no one from no one.



Domenico de Clario

Domenico de Clario is an interdisciplinary artist, writer and musician. He was born in Trieste, Italy, in 1947 and migrated to Australia in 1956. He was awarded an MA (1998) and a PhD (2001) in Performance Studies from Melbourne's Victoria University. He taught art at PIT/RMIT (1973-1996) and was Head of School of Contemporary Arts at Perth's ECU (2001-6) and of the Fine Arts Department at Monash University (2006-9). From 2009 until 2012 he was Director of Adelaide's Australian Experimental Art Foundation. Since 1966 de Clario has presented more than 300 solo exhibitions, installations and performances and received numerous grants and residencies, including the Australia Council Fellowship. In 2016 he founded the museum of innocence mildura and he is currently serving as Chair of the Arts Mildura Board as well as Chair of the Mildura Contemporary Practice Committee.

Prior to that for ten years he toured full-time dance theatre shows for Strange Fruit to Europe, North America, Mexico, South America, Russia, Japan, and all around Asia. He has performed at hundreds of major venues including The National Theatre London, The Centro Bellas Artes Mexico City, Streb Studio New York, Tanz Fabrik Berlin, and The Arts Centre Melbourne. Paul received a Masters degree in 2010 for research into contemporary performance of dance and clown. In 2012 he received an Australian Post Graduate Award, and in 2018 he graduated with a PhD from Melbourne University. His PhD research investigated street theatre and performance art – he made a solo work for his PhD which he performed at Federation Square in Melbourne. (20 mins) – performance


As much as the Greek god, Pan is half human, half goat, we are all beings in-between not only in the intersectional sphere, but also in the time and space.

Dianne Dickson

Dianne's new body of work that reflects on a unique experience of the Australian outback. Following research carried out in my Master of Fine Arts degree (VCA), and recent exhibitions in Australia and overseas, these artworks further my exploration of this area (Rainbow), its people, and the environment. The exhibition would provide the space to exhibit these new sculptural photographs professionally and reach an audience that is connected geographically to the content.

(durationl) – installation

My practice concerns poetic connections between the body, landscape and memory through painting, drawing, photography, video and sculpture. In particular, I am interested in how a collaged approach to artmaking reflects the obscured nature of recalling past events. More specifically, my work has involved combining historic and contemporary imagery from the Mallee region of Victoria where I grew up, with additions of drawing and text. In this combination, the images become ghost-like or nostalgic representations of this specific post-colonial environment. The narrative in these artworks shifts in the same way that memory does; this reflects on my own life experience in the region, which at times has felt obscured, and has been deeply affected by the landscape, isolation, trauma, violence, innocence, hope and community.

Reuben Lewis

Reuben's practice is both singular and eclectic. As an award-winning composer, improviser, bandleader and producer he has refined a diverse electro-acoustic language, devised through trumpet with extended techniques and preparations alongside live analogue processing with pedals and samplers, that is as much at home in a nightclub as it is on a hilltop in Malaysia surrounded by dancers and bull-trance shamans. As a solo artist, his work has been described as "a vivid listening experience that gleams with sinister detail" (The Wire) and "beyond category" (The Australian), whilst his ensemble I Hold the Lion's Paw has been described as "a beguiling stew of afro-beat, jazzrock-inflected postbop, and electro-acoustic noise" (The Wire) and reflecting the "feeling of having stumbled into someone else's LSD trip" (Sydney Morning Herald).

Reuben considers improvisation to be at the core of his artistic practice, both as a vehicle for meaningful collaboration that transcends stylistic or disciplinary boundaries as well as a fundamental philosophy behind making new work. His music aims to play on our expectations and unravel all semblance of familiar form, and in doing so seek to create a new

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
narrative, one that is just between us the listener and the sound world.

He has received critical acclaim for my projects, including Art Music Awards for the studio album 'Closed Beginnings' with Australian Art Orchestra (AAO), and for the 24hr live telematic work 'Silent Towns' with the Phonetic Orchestra.

Gretel Taylor

Gretel performs site-responsive works and curates place-based events. She has evolved an improvisational dance practice of relating to place during her PhD and ongoing investigations. This 'locating' practice is informed by Body Weather, a physical training developed by Japanese dancer Min Tanaka. Grappling with her presence as a descendent of the colonizing peoples on unceded Aboriginal Country has also continued to inform (or haunt) Gretel's work. Recent performances include Restless, which won best sitespecific work for Immerse public art program, 2021; and screendance work Co-habit, made with photographer /videographer Laki Sideris, selected for the 2nd International Ecoperformance Festival, São Paulo, 2022.

Gretel has been a key artist of Environmental Performance Authority (EPA) since its formation in 2013, with whom she collaboratively creates and performs participatory ecological walking performances. She also continues to collaborate with Laki Sideris with whom she has produced a body of dance-placephotography work. Gretel has taught in Dance and Performance courses at Deakin, Monash, RMIT and Victoria Universities. She currently teaches Body Weather Training at Dancehouse, curates art and performance programs, and occasionally writes on art, dance and place.
